## **Activity Overview**

Archaeological Site Alteration: An application to alter a protected archaeological site. It is recommended that you consult with an eligible qualified professional archaeologist to complete this technical document.

## **What You Need To Apply**

### **Eligibility Requirements**

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Ensure that you meet the eligibility requirements prior to applying.

Requirement Type	Requirement Detail
Legal right to the land or authorization by land owner.	You must be able to provide proof of your legal right to the land. Private land requires proof of ownership, such as a Certificate of Title. Crown land requires a copy of the Crown land tenure document. If you are not the owner, you must provide proof of authorization by owner.

## **Information Requirements**

The following information is required as part of the application process. The requirements for the mandatory authorization(s) are included.

Application for Site Alteration Permit	Description of proposed alterations, the specific location of the proposed development and a summary of what is known about the site to date. This may include summaries of existing documents (e.g., other reports). See form for detail.	<a href="#">Application for Site Alteration Permit</a>
Maps	Maps will show the proposed alterations at various scales. Maps will include detail such as proposed development(s) and will comply to standards. See link provided for detailed standards.	<a href="#">Map and Shapefile Standards</a>
Disposition of Materials Collected	Name of branch-approved repository for materials collected during assessment.	
Consent or Agreement Document	Consent to use personal information in the application document. Certification that applicant is familiar with Heritage Conservation Act and the contents of the application. Note: additional client certifications can be included.

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Requirement Type	Information Requirement	When Required
Archaeological Impact Assessment	See Links section for Archaeological Impact Assessment Guidelines.	When there is insufficient information available regarding the archaeological site to determine if a site alteration permit can be issued.
Archaeological Site Data Request Terms	See Links section for details on who can apply and for access to the application form.	To access existing archaeological assessment information for an archaeological site. Applicant must demonstrate a need/right to know this information.
Hire an eligible qualified archaeologist	For further information you may wish to contact an eligible qualified archaeologist see link in Links section for BC Association of Professional Archaeologist.	When alterations require concurrent archaeological work such as a site assessment, monitoring, or excavation.
